



Canada exempts bifacial solar modules

In his announcement, the President included an exemption for bifacial solar panels. This decision comes after the ITC recommended in November 2021 to extend the safeguard tariffs for an additional four years.

Importers who signed contracts by May 16, 2024, may import bifacial solar panels without Section 201 duties from June 26, 2024, to September 23, 2024, provided the contract terms have not changed.

There is no domestic production of this kind of solar panel, which has the ability to absorb light on both sides. However, since these were the only imported panels that weren't subject to Section 201 ...
